This work is accompanied by a letter of authenticity from Dr Joachim Pissarro and will be included in the forthcoming *Catalogue Raisonné of Drawings by Camille Pissarro*.

This drawing is extremely interesting in that it is a series of studies of the same man as he loads (or unloads) a jar from his ox. The jar, while unclear as to its exact use, is most likely not a churn as the sticks shown in the studies are used as a balance for the object when carried by the animal. The light, fragmented use of pencil coupled with black ink, used to solidify the figure, and hatch marks for form, as well as the figures' clothing and features, indicates that this compilation of studies was executed by Pissarro in Venezuela.
